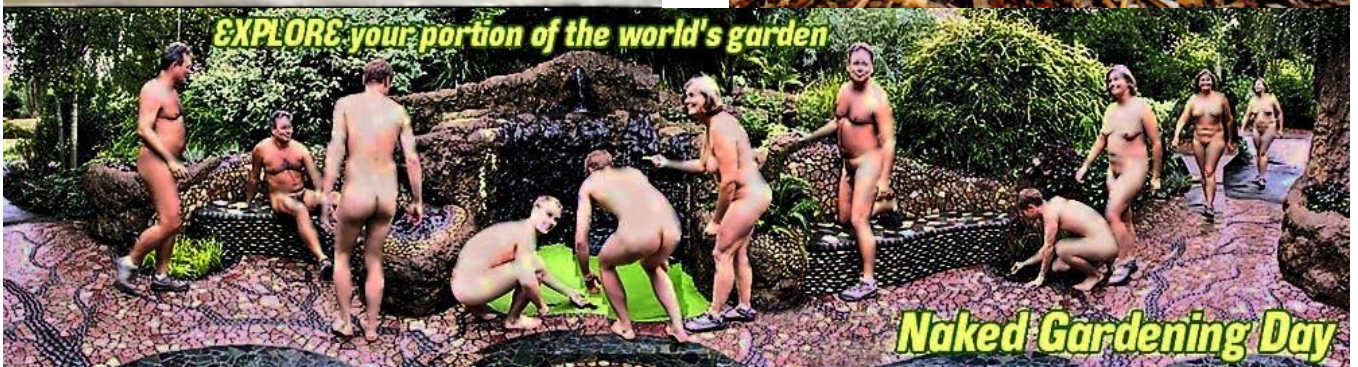

## When push comes to shove!

### Can't bare it: Neighbours' stoush over nude sunbathing ends up in court

A naked man was reading a book while lying on a deserted Otago beach, but soon his peace would be shattered.

The curious case of the naked sunbather unfolded near the small coastal township of Kaka Point, in the Clutha District.

The tension between Lloyd Hayden Bonnar, who had a holiday home in the area, and his neighbours June and Ian Kreger started when the latter removed some trees which had previously afforded Bonnar's property some privacy.

The tension was exacerbated by Bonnar's naturist beliefs which he maintained by using the beach in front of his and the Kreger property for nude sunbathing and swimming.

"You couldn't find two more polar opposite neighbours," Bonnar's lawyer, Michael Bott, told Stuff.

The less than neighbourly dispute led to a local police officer proposing a novel solution. That involved Bonnar going from his house to the beach wearing either shorts or a towel wrapped around himself, and then sunbathing "out of sight".

Upon entering the water, Bonnar was told to leave the towel or shorts at the high tide mark.

However, the agreement did not mark an end to the dispute.

On October 4, 2020, Bonnar was sunbathing naked on a towel and reading a book at the deserted Willsher Bay, south of the township.

Wayne Duncan, the son-in-law of June Kreger, was staying at the Kreger property, along with his wife and daughter and an 8-year-old boy, for the weekend.

According to a reserved decision of Judge Kevin Phillips, the couple walked across the road to sit on a bench by the beach, and saw a naked Bonnar about 6m away reading a book.

Bonnar appeared unconcerned they were there, but Duncan told him to cover up or move away.

"Bugger off," Bonnar replied. He said it was his right to be there.

Duncan told the court he found it offensive that Bonnar was naked, but also offensive for his wife, daughter and the other child, who had been playing at the water's edge.

When Duncan took his phone out of his pocket, Bonnar placed a book over his genitals.

As the children returned from the beach, Bonnar stood up, put his shorts on and walked up the steps.

Duncan told Bonnar he had contacted police, to which he replied: "I look forward to seeing you in court." He then pushed Duncan with his right hand three times on his left shoulder.

Duncan said each push was stronger than the previous one and on the third push, he stumbled but did not fall.

As Duncan returned to the Kreger property across the road, they saw Bonnar standing on his deck completely naked, filming them.

Later that day, Duncan returned to the beach with his daughter, only to see a naked Bonnar emerge from the water. It was only when Duncan took his phone out that Bonnar covered his genitals.

Photos of Bonnar, taken by Duncan, were produced as evidence in court.

Bonnar became aggressive and started to swear, saying it was not against the law to be naked on the beach, Duncan told the court.

"No, but it is against the law to offend and [exhibit] offensive behaviour," he replied.

Under cross-examination by Bott, Duncan accepted that Bonnar's naturist activities – swimming and sunbathing – were confined to the water's edge.

The issue for Duncan and his family was that Bonnar did not cover up when people were present, but only when cameras came out.

"That's my understanding of the law – that it is not illegal to be naked, but it is illegal to have offensive behaviour [and] knowingly offend people with your nakedness," Duncan said under cross-examination.

Duncan's daughter described Bonnar as "flaunting his genitals" on the beach, and later on the deck.

She disagreed that a person had a right to lay naked on a beach and thought he could only do so when nobody else was present, she told the court.

Judge Phillips said he essentially had to decide whether the defendant being naked on the beach amounted to him acting in an offensive manner.

Bott submitted his client had the right to be naked within the context of the high-water mark and the beach, and that sunbathing and swimming while naked was not indulging in "exhibitionistic activity".

Judge Phillips agreed that Bonnar being naked was not equivalent to him "parading his genitalia" and acting offensively.

He dismissed the charge of behaving in an offensive manner, but found Bonnar guilty of common assault.

Bonnar was ordered to come up for sentencing if called upon within six months.

Bott told Stuff the case was about freedom of expression, and "the mere sight of a naked body should not be seen as offensive".

That thinking was out of touch with contemporary New Zealand, he said.

Bonnar, who made headlines in 2007 after he fired warning shots at two burglars on his rural property, said in a statement he was a private person.

He said he did not intend to bother anybody, and it was a shame his neighbours couldn't do the same thing.

## New Zealand Police - [Guidance Notes](#)

In the absence of official guidelines to New Zealand Police that specifically deal with the Nudist Lifestyle and what constitutes appropriate and inappropriate behaviour in accordance with New Zealand law, Hauraki Naturally offers this page as a guide to enable Police Officers to be consistent and to have a recognised standard approach when responding to complaints of nudity from members of the public.

We are not experts on the law, and we do not expect the New Zealand Police to be fully knowledgeable on the Nudist philosophy, but we hope this guide will provide a path to mutual understanding of what is, and what is not, appropriate behaviour so that, firstly, responding officers will not find themselves needlessly wasting time and resources and secondly, that genuine nudists will be free to go about their lawful activities without fear of needless police intervention.

This guide is based on a [similar document](#) issued by the College of Policing (UK), adapted to align with New Zealand statutes, precedents in law, and conditions.

### Public nudity guidance and decision aid:

Naturism can be defined as “a way of life characterised by the practice of nudity, both alone and in social settings. It encourages self-respect, respect for others and for the environment, embodying freedom and a unique sense of communion with nature. It is purposely non-erotic and non-sexual. The Nudist philosophy asserts that the naked human body is inherently decent and that clothing should not be worn out of shame, but for practical reasons such as warmth, protection.”



While some confine their activities to their own private property or in clubs, many use public beaches, lakes and rivers throughout New Zealand. Others engage in hiking and tramping in country areas and national parks, leisure areas and other public spaces. There is no legal power in New Zealand to designate particular areas as “nudist” or otherwise.

Naturists have a right to freedom of expression, which only engages criminal law if they commit sexual offences or use disorderly behaviour that they intend to or are aware may be disorderly within the hearing or sight of a person likely to be caused harassment, alarm or distress. For behaviour to be “offensive behaviour”, it must be calculated to wound the feelings, arouse anger or resentment or disgust or outrage in the mind of a reasonable person.

Although officers should consider every situation according to its own circumstances, forces should adopt a consistent approach to naturism to maintain public confidence in the police and to avoid the inappropriate use of police powers. Due diligence needs to be exercised, therefore, with regard to Section 5 of the Crown Law document, [SOLICITOR-GENERAL’S PROSECUTION GUIDELINES, 1 July 2013](#): The Decision To Prosecute.

The test for prosecution needs to meet the evidential test criterion of, among other elements, the “Commission of a Criminal Offence”. This requires that careful analysis is made of the law in order to identify what offence or offences may have been committed and to consider the evidence against each of the ingredients that establish the particular offence.

Three pieces of legislation are available for consideration in relation to public nakedness:

• **Section 4, Summary Offences Act 1981:** Offensive behaviour or language

(1) *Every person is liable to a fine not exceeding \$1,000 who,—*

(a) *in or within view of any public place, behaves in an offensive or disorderly manner.*

Conduct amounting to an offence under Section 4, Summary Offences Act 1981 requires that a person needs to have used disorderly behaviour within the hearing or sight of a person likely to be caused harassment, alarm or distress. To get a conviction, officers would have to prove something more than, for example, that some people were seriously offended. They would have to prove an offender disrupted public order so much that other members of the public were unable to go about their normal activities in that public place. For behaviour to be “offensive behaviour,” it must be calculated to wound the feelings, arouse anger or resentment or disgust or outrage in the mind of a reasonable person.

Legal precedents have been set by the courts in respect of Section 4:

1. The Ceramalus case of 1991 (an appeal to the High Court won) determined that the legal definition of "offensive" was not met by mere nakedness, even in the presence of school children, in a place where nudity was "not uncommon" or "known to occur".

2. The Lowe case of March 2010 determined that Mr Lowe's nakedness while cycling along a country road had not met the test of offensive or disorderly behaviour. Justice Dennis Clifford quashed the conviction and fine.

**NOTE:** It is common for people to believe they must "protect" children from seeing a naked adult. The fact is that there is no empirical evidence to suggest that this is in any way harmful to children. If it was, then it would be illegal for children to attend Nudist Clubs. In fact, there is plenty of evidence to suggest that nakedness is beneficial to children, enhancing body-positivity, self-worth and acceptance.

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• **Section 27, Summary Offences Act 1981:** Indecent exposure

*(1) Every person is liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 3 months or a fine not exceeding \$2,000 who, in or within view of any public place, intentionally and obscenely exposes any part of his or her genitals.*

The defining word here is "obscenely". A charge under this section requires proof that some obscenity has been committed. Obscenity requires some element of lewdness or lasciviousness, so this charge is regarded as inappropriate for a case of mere nakedness. However, lewd acts of a sexual nature would certainly fit in this category.

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• **Section 125, Crimes Act, 1961:** Indecent act in public place

*(1) Every one is liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding 2 years who willfully does any indecent act in any place to which the public have or are permitted to have access, or within view of any such place.*

This piece of legislation is not used in cases of simple public nudity because being naked is not, by definition, an act. An "act" involves carrying out an action; doing something; performing a deed. Simply being naked is not an act. For this charge to succeed there has to have been an indecent act performed, for example, masturbating in view of the public.

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A nudist whose intention is limited to going about their lawful business while naked will not be guilty of any of these indecency offences.

It should be understood consistently throughout New Zealand Police that prosecution will normally only be considered if a substantive offence has been committed and both the public interest and evidential tests are met. The tests will be based on proportionality to the seriousness of the incident and the likely level of sanction, recognising that in recent years attempted prosecutions of nudists have all failed.

In deciding what action to take, officers need to also consider that any arrest, while unlikely to lead to prosecution, could result in a lasting impact on the individual and their career. This is an important factor to consider in terms of the proportionality of the police response.

In the lawful situation where there is an absence of any sexual context in relation to nudity and where the person does not intend the behaviour to be, and is not aware that it may be disorderly, it will not be appropriate to take any police action. The following decision aid may assist in determining the most appropriate and lawful response to a reported incident.

**NOTE:** Officers and staff receiving reports need to avoid their personal views on public nudity affecting their decision making, which must be based on the legal framework that exists.

**Decision aid for call handlers**  
**Questions to ask of someone reporting public nudity:**

- ... Is the person in a place where there are other people?
- ... Are they in their own home or garden?
- ... What is the person doing?
- ... Are they doing something sexual or are they just naked?
- ... Did the person see you?
- ... Did they say or do anything towards you (like flaunting themselves)?
- ... Do they seem to be unwell, or under the influence of drink or drugs?

## "Donkey Bay Inn: Northland's most seductive adults-only hideaway"

Our suite is called Skyfall. And it's unapologetically seductive. We're talking floor-to-ceiling mirrors surrounding a luxurious king bed, a bath that looks like it was designed for a Roman Emperor, and a shower with special lighting that creates a dramatic silhouette for those that use it. I have never seen anything like this. It's the kind of place where your jaw drops around every turn.

The sprawling mansion is hidden in the side of a hill in Russell, overlooking the Bay of Islands. And I mean hidden. It's been built under 330-tonnes of soil, with a big flax plantation on top. Our room has glass windows running its entire length overlooking a beach, and the vast expanse of the Bay of Islands. If the next Bond film needs a suitably dramatic hidden hotel, this is it. The mystery of the Donkey Bay Inn starts the moment your car pulls up. The only clue that something spectacular awaits is a pink wall, with a bright yellow tunnel, framed by two big statues.

The light reflects inside the tunnel, creating an almost 'yellow brick road' feel of excitement. Through the tunnel, you pop out at an open-air zen garden of lush tropical plants. The path continues to the glass-lined circular entrance of the Inn.



Inside you're greeted by an elaborate library and wrought-iron spiral staircase on one side, and a huge lounge with plush semi-circle velvet couch on the other. Oversized bean bags in every colour of the rainbow sit outside on the deck.

The place is a little like Northland's version of a museum of modern art, with pieces perfectly dotted around every corner. It's a boutique-theme on steroids. I caution myself that I'll need to take out a mortgage if I knock anything over.

And then you notice the view. The entire front of the Inn is floor-to-ceiling glass, framed against the expansive Bay of Islands. One suite, Tosca's Room, is on the left wing of the house, which opens up to an ocean-front courtyard.

The suitably named Emperor's Room on the right wing is described as a grand apartment and includes a large conservatory also overlooking the sea.

Then there's our suite, Skyfall. The entrance is up a long set of wooden stairs to the top storey. There's a plush lounge, which leading to a mirror-lined bedroom with a gigantic bathroom at the end. Everything is designed towards the view; even the glass shower is set right up against the balcony to maximise the vista. You can waste a lot of water if you get too distracted.

In another unexpected twist, the deck overlooks a semi-private beach - a few hundred metres down the hill - used by

naturalists. If that's not your cup of tea you can swim at the adjacent Long Beach, one of the most beautiful in Russell.

The Inn's best secret is found along a walkway on its own little peninsula; a set of his & her outdoor baths overlooking the sea.

We spent the day wondering who the genius was behind everything. There are literally dozens of art features inside the Inn - such as the enormous Jesus statue surrounded by candles - and you notice something new every time you wander through - but it doesn't feel remotely cluttered or tacky. It takes someone with exceptional attention to detail and style to pull that off.

It turns out the hotel is owned by a kind, charismatic, and equally gregarious Italian named Antonio Pasquale, who has lived in Northland for decades. He owns most of the Donkey Bay peninsula, and rather than subdivide and develop it, he's kept most of the land virtually untouched.

It's when we sat down with Pasquale on the deck of the Inn, drinking coffee and eating fruit salad, it all made sense. The Italian is a doctor of philosophy and a winemaker; no doubt his thoughts are even more highly tuned when the two are combined.



Just like a philosopher, Pasquale has applied methodical thinking behind every detail of the Inn. He's created the perfect place to relax; with enough to keep the brain distracted when it gets sick of doing absolutely nothing.

The next morning we woke to the sun rising over the ocean, its beams reflecting off the mirrors and creating an orange glow in the room. A sumptuous breakfast was laid out downstairs; the aromas wafting in our window and creating an almost gravitational pull.

We learned over breakfast, from our bubbly host Amelia, that the property is called Donkey Bay Inn because the peninsula was a lookout during the Second World War, and donkeys were used to take munitions up the hill.

Today, the name doesn't really do the place justice. But then again, as Pasquale explained, he wants his guests to 'expect the unexpected.' And calling it a simple Inn, when he's actually created one of New Zealand's most unique luxury stays, does just that.

A night at the [Donkey Bay Inn](#) starts at \$600-\$900 per a couple depending on the season, which includes breakfast.

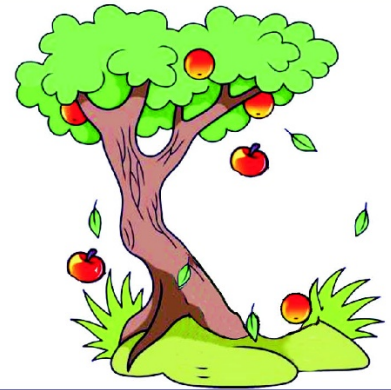

So I checked their site: [donkeybayinn.co.nz](http://donkeybayinn.co.nz) (also a surprise as they used to avoid using 'Donkey' Bay in their name) and discovered a shift of ethos from simply 'naturalist-friendly' to perhaps 'lower classes' need not apply! - because the minimum tariff is \$1000/night with a minimum of 3 nights! That 'Adults-only' specification in the article's title is actually just a 'no children' request to avoid potential disturbance for their high-paying guests. From our point of view though, the blue notification at the public entrance to that beach remains as is: still inviting **all** naturalist use.

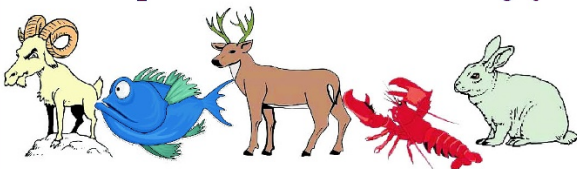

Raewyn & Rosco's farm has plenty of room for parking, whatever vehicle you arrive in. On-site accommodation includes a caravan with double bed (and nearby external toilet) while upstairs in their house you'll find a twin room and a double room with ensuite. Outside, along with the big bird life, two kayaks are available for exploration of the Rangaunu Harbour, which is easily accessed through the mangroves on their southern border. Easy access to East Beach is 9km further along Kaimaumau Road: drive to the end and walk 200 m north.
